# Chairman's Report:

As you all know, last year was our Golden Anniversary and we did all we could to make the year a little bit special. We had some really interesting garden visits and for some of these members were invited to meet for a pub lunch after, which brought a celebratory feel to our days out. It is something we hope to continue as long as members want it. Although one garden visit had to be cancelled due to lack of interest most were well supported. It does take a lot of time to arrange these visits so please support where possible.

Our Show was again well supported with some fine exhibits. Many thanks to those who did manage to exhibit. We do encourage members to have a go; help is always available if needed.

You will all have had a questionnaire last year to see what members want from the group. From those who replied it was clear that more basic information was needed, especially for new members or beginners. We have taken that on board and at this year's AGM we are having a short demonstration on staging for shows for new exhibitors. It is just the start of our plans for the future.

Hopefully within the year we will also have some foundational information on growing irises. It is easy to forget that we were new members once and needed advice and help. We are looking at other areas where we can go back to basics.

Our virtual show was also really well supported by members with some fine photos, allowing us to have a glimpse into members gardens and collections. Many thanks to all those who took the time to take pictures and enter.

The committee has decided that we need to be more visible in order to attract more members. We already have our display at Malvern and 2024 was a good show for us. We managed to get a Silver Award and had a lot of good feedback from the public. Malvern is our local shop window where we can blow our trumpet. Our volunteers were absolutely fantastic and interacted with the public really well. I think all enjoyed themselves; there was lots of laughter and I thank all of them for giving up their time. This year we have been restricted to a smaller display, due to lack of room in the marquee, but we will still need volunteers so please speak to me if you want to be part of the show.

In addition, we applied to Shrewsbury Flower Show for a place in their Floral Marquee. We did this as a joint operation with the BIS. I must say that it was a great show, not just in the marquee but overall. Once again volunteers turned out to help, so thanks to those. We have applied again for this year on our own, and again, may need volunteers.

Last year we were also asked to take a display to the Alpine Garden Society show at Pershore. We enjoyed being there and the AGS appreciated us so much that we were invited back this year, where we were awarded another Silver Award and gained 2 new members. This year they have also invited us to the AGS show at Malvern on 12 April. We need to take all the opportunities we can to encourage membership of our Group. It is becoming clear that groups like ours need to form links with other groups/ societies to ensure our future at a time when most people prefer digital interactions to face to face hobbies.

The Talk and Lunch was a successful event with an excellent talk on *Crocus* by Tony Goode. We were very lucky to have two fantastic volunteers to serve the catered buffet which allowed all members to enjoy the day. I would like to express my sincere thanks to them for helping making it such a lovely event.

We are only able to cover the costs of putting on special events by the hard work of volunteers at the Shows and those who donate plants for sale. We also benefitted from sales of the Moorcroft collection that was kindly designed by Moorcroft for our anniversary. The ceramics were quite stunning and were admired by members of the public at the events where they were displayed. We owe Moorcroft a great debt of gratitude. With plant sales throughout the year and the Moorcroft donations we are in a healthy financial situation. At this time I would like to express thanks to Rex, who is stepping down this year, for all his work as Treasurer/Membership Secretary. (At this point the members showed their appreciation to Rex in the usual way.)

As part of our anniversary celebrations, we hosted the BIS AGM at Holton Village Hall. This included a very interesting talk on Crocosmias and Gladioli by Paul Lewis followed by a buffet lunch. In the afternoon we continued the day with a visit to Waterperry Gardens. It was a very enjoyable day and the weekend was concluded on the Sunday with an optional visit to the Grange at Chalgrove, an absolutely stunning garden.

Although a very special year it was somewhat marred by the loss of our own Sue Bedwell. Sue was so full of knowledge and a great friend to not only to myself but to many of our members. She was a valuable member of the committee and will be greatly missed. Sue was instrumental in organising the Waterperry visit and finding the speaker. Several of us attended her funeral and it was no great surprise that the crematorium was packed. I am sure more will be said about Sue in our next *Newsletter*.

We are still looking for new members on the committee so that some may step aside. We are happy to welcome Jackie Bostock to the committee where she will be a great asset.

I would just like to end with a big thank you to all our members for staying with us and to those on the committee for all their hard work and to Jill for all the work she does to maintain the smooth running of the Group.

2025 already has a full programme of events which we hope you will try to attend.

# Hon Treasurer's report:

At the end of 2024 the Group had 62 members which included 2 new members. So far this year 2025 we have 6 new members (4 from the Alpine show at Pershore and 2 re-joiners).

At the time of writing this report (3rd April) we have 58 'paid up' and 7 unpaid members, who I am actively chasing for responses! There has been 1 resignation so far this year. I am pleased to inform you that the slight increase in membership is most welcome, but I would like to see even more new members this year.

There were more opportunities to swell the bank account in the year. We had a stand at the Alpine Garden Society Show at Pershore which made a small surplus of £27.00. The Malvern Show, thanks to the hard work and generosity of the 'Malvern Team' and some members, raised an amazing total of £978.60 which included a Silver Award from the RHS. Our annual show proved very popular as usual and raised an income of £257.69.

For the first time we had a shared stand with the BIS at the Shrewsbury Flower Show, which is the "oldest flower show" in England. The show was well attended and we achieved a Gold Award. The surplus from this show was shared with the BIS, but increased the account by £686.42. This year was the 50th anniversary of the founding of the Group. Our annual Tea & Talk event became a Talk and Lunch. Fern Harding, with her food background and catering experience, took responsibility for the lunch and produced a magnificent feast which was enjoyed by everybody.

As members, you will know that at several of the events last year we have been able to display the superb collection of Moorcroft vases made specially for the Group to celebrate our 50th anniversary. You may not be aware that the Group receives a commission payment from Moorcroft of the sales of the "Irresistible Irises". This figure for 2024 amounted to over £1200.00. Moorcroft continue the sales of collections for a 12-month period so I am hopeful for a further payment to cover the first quarter of this current year.

Financially we ended the year in a good position, with a balance of £5991.02. This is an increase of £1119.46 over 2023.

As I mentioned at last year's AGM, I wished to retire from the position of Treasurer of the Group. I'm pleased to tell you that the new treasurer Sue Bramall will be taking up the position after this year's Malvern show. I would like to wish Sue every success in the role.

There are copies of the P&L and summary sheet for 2024 and I will be happy to answer any questions.

I have brought copies of the Summer Show and Talk and Lunch poster. I would like everybody here today to take a couple of large and several smaller posters away with them and display the poster prominently. The poster is double sided, so make sure you put the show side out first!

Finally, upon my retirement from the position as Treasurer of the Group, it has been a privilege to assist the committee for the last 13 years and I would like to thank all the committee members both past and present for their help and guidance.

#### **Annual Show Report:**

Our Golden Show was a tremendous success with Ian being kept busy with all the various records that need to be kept. Most Points in the Show went to Jeremy Handy, with Alun Whitehead winning the Special Golden Class with his exhibit of *Iris* 'Cloud over Clee', which appropriately was bred by Jennifer Hewitt. We had a good number of visitors which certainly helped the plant sales and it was good to see that many stopped and enjoyed a cuppa and of course the cake! Our thanks go to Sheila Handy, who did a marvellous job in the kitchen and to all those who helped at the show in any way.

We also enjoyed a bumper Virtual Show with more entries, 177 in fact, and a number of new exhibitors. Best in Show went to Alun Whitehead for his exhibit of *Iris* 'Hoar Edge' and the Special Golden Class was

won by James Watson with his exhibit of *Crocus* 'Romance'. The full results of both Shows have been circulated to members, but again our thanks go to all our exhibitors.

The 2025 Group Show will be held on Sunday 25 May, at Highnam Community Centre and entries for the Virtual Show can be submitted between 1st-14th August. All members are encouraged to contribute and show schedules are on our website.

**2025** Events: A full programme has already been circulated and further details of the various visits will also be included in the *Spring Bulletin*. Details of the next members' meeting were given.

RHS Malvern Spring Festival 8th-11th May. The RHS have allocated us a stand in the Floral Marquee, but it will be much reduced in size as the Floral Marque is over subscribed. Therefore it will be an information type stand. New information boards have been purchased to enhance the display. Volunteers are still needed to man the stand, especially to cover the weekend. Iris and Iridaceae plants sales was discussed and it was agreed to keep to the current 50/50 spilt between the grower and the group. Pot sizes are standardised as either 1L or 2L square or square/rounds. All members were encouraged to contribute and the normal double label system would operate with the price of the plants being set as either £5 or £10 depending on pot size.

Shrewsbury Flower Show 8 & 9 August An application has been made for this show, but this year it would be a stand alone event for the Group. The Malvern information type stand would be repeated and again Volunteers to help over the two days were needed. Iris and Iridaceae plants would also be needed for this show and further information for both events would be included in the Spring Bulletin. [nb This show has now been cancelled—Ed]

# **Any Other Business:**

- 1. Judi Deakin requested contributions for the *Spring Bulletin*, including details of members' open gardens and other iris related events of interest to our members. She would also appreciate contributions for the *Newsletter*; new authors would be especially welcome as would images.
- 2. Anne Milner informed members that they would be welcome to visit, by prior appointment, to see her two National Collections.
- 3. Rex Harden made the suggestion that our *Newsletter* should be re-branded with the following suggestions being offered: Year Book, Review and Annual Review. Further discussion would be needed before a change was made.

The Chairman thanked all for attending our AGM

After the AGM, we enjoyed a practical demonstration on showing, with many hints and tips kindly shared by Jeremy Handy. The afternoon was spent exploring Batsford Arboretum, with its beautiful spring foliage.

With the BIS Show season in full swing and our own Annual Show not so far off, here are a few Handy Hints from Jeremy's talk:

Vases, moss and newspaper are provided at the Show. Be careful to choose the right size of vase for your exhibit.

If showing a plant in a pot, make sure everything is tidy. Clean the pot, remove any dead or dying foliage and cut the brown bits from the end of leaves in an inverted V shape, mimicking the natural line of the leaf.

Judges don't touch the exhibits so position yours to show off its best side

If showing stem(s) put a small amount of water in the bottom of the vase and secure the stem in place with screwed up newspaper, taking care that this doesn't touch the water (otherwise there's a lot of mess left at the end!). Cover the newspaper with moss or green tissue.

Beardless exhibits are usually displayed in 3s or 5s. Present the stems at different heights—eg two tall and one shorter.

Before the Show: check the schedule (in the Autumn/Winter Bulletin or on the website) carefully for the class requirements. Label your stems as you pick them but remove these labels before showing; Ian, our Show Secretary, will have cards for you to display on the bench. Garden Velcro can be used to wrap the buds before the Show, in the hope that they will open when the Velcro is removed. If they don't, blowing gently on them may do the trick.

Oasis (soaked) may be used to secure blooms if you have it.

There are Novice classes on the Schedule and help is always available on the day so have a go.

Following Jeremy's demonstration, Jill treated us to a slideshow taking us through the various Show classes, illustrating her presentation with displays from past Shows and successful exhibits.

Our thanks to Jeremy and Jill and my apologies for not having any photos to go with this report. I somehow managed to delete them from the SD card instead of transferring them! I do however have a few from our afternoon stroll in lovely sunshine. (Ed)





My favourite spot was definitely Simon Verity's statue of Daphne surrounded by *Leucojum aestivum* and *Fritillaria meleagris*.




But the big frits were pretty spectacular too:

# The West and Midlands Very Educational and Informative Visit to the Melcourt Establishment

On arrival we were greeted with hot drinks and biscuits by our hostess Vicky. She then took us pictorially, through the stages of the process in the manufacturing of their products. Wood bark from soft wood conifers and spruce is their main ingredient. Every part of the tree that was once discarded, after taking the main wooden tree trunk, is now used in their processes, from the bark to the dust on the forest floor.

After Vicky's presentation, she took us out to show the workings of the facility.

She first took us to what she called her store or ingredients room: she referred, tongue in cheek, to this being her 'Big Kitchen' holding all the ingredients for the various mixes that were put together in the factory. The store was a sequence of huge bays which held all the necessary ingredients to make up the various bags of growing media.



The business began in 1983 on this disused WW2 airfield. The factory, with its enormous machines, is housed in an aeroplane hangar. Inside this vast space we watched machines mix, measure and bag up the composts without a human hand to help them. It was quite fascinating and mesmerising to watch it all happen in such a slick manner.

Vicky showed us the plastic bag store, which held an array of printed plastic like huge bolts of cloth. The thickness of the bags had to be strong enough to be handled by storekeepers and, eventually, gardeners without falling apart.

Outside, in the vast yard, she encouraged us to handle and smell the various ingredients each having different properties and a different scent.

The yard itself was very busy, with huge lorries coming onto the weighbridge and then distributing their loads into the appropriate bays. There were also huge tractors with buckets on the front scooping up loads, from the same bays, and distributing them into specific hoppers which fed the machines inside the factory so that nothing stopped the bag filling.

We were shepherded carefully around the yard and factory in high visibility jackets so that we didn't end up in the mix. The quality control seemed to be of a very high standard.

It was a thoroughly enjoyable experience. We said a big thank you to Vicky for being so informative and patient with our questions and another big thank you to Jill for organising the tour.

#### 12 noon Lunch at The Cattle Shed, Penrhos Court, Kington (self-funded)

Afternoon: Rhodds Farm, Lyonshall, Kington HR5 3LW. Entrance is £8.00. Developed by the current owners, Richard and Cary Goode, over the last 20 years, the garden comprises over two acres with a further extensive area of woodland. The garden design uses the borrowed landscape with views of both the Malvern Hills and the Black Mountains. Specific features are the Dovecot, which forms a distinctive feature in a more formal area; the wildlife pond, surrounded with moisture loving plants; a gravel garden in front of the Tea Pavilion and a number of sculptures. Cary trained at the English Garden School so expect spectacular planting. The managed woodland is mainly broadleaf native trees, but the edges and transitional areas have been planted and include a small arboretum with some interesting and unusual trees and shrubs and an avenue of white stemmed birch.

## Tuesday 19 August 2pm:

Ridgeway Barn, Evesham Rd, Cookhill, Alcester, B49 5LJ. Jon and Jane Segar do not usually open their garden to the public but have kindly offered to give us a guided tour around their 3 acre site.

When they acquired Ridgeway Barn in 1995 it was a farmyard with no trees, flowers or garden. Two years after moving in they acquired the adjacent 2 acre field and thus the creation of their present garden began. This is a sloping site which faces the distant Malvern Hills. After 29 years they have created 3 small courtyard gardens, a large pond, and planted over 1000 trees as a windbreak under which they have planted a woodland garden. During the Covid lockdown they established some prairie style planting. Also to be seen are raised beds on the potager, a small orchard and a collection of sculptures collected over many years. This is a garden that is rarely open to the public so do take advantage of this opportunity. The cost is £10 per head and will include refreshments – all proceeds go to the charity Perennial.

The Rhydd Gardens, Worcester Road, Hanley Castle, Worcester, WR8 0AB (gates 200m N of layby on B4211).

Two walled gardens and a 60 ft greenhouse from the early 1800s set in six acres with wonderful views of the entire length of the Malvern ridge. One walled garden is designed with formal paths and colourful borders bounded by box hedging and there are fruit trees in espaliers and cordons as they would have been when the garden was first set out. Other features include a nature area with walks and some woodland. The garden is mostly level with easy access. Cost £12 to include tea and cake. All monies to NGS
